"Have No Fear, Little Flock"

Grace to you and peace from God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ.

Have no fear, little flock; Have no fear, little flock For the Father has chosen To give you the Kingdom; Have no fear, little flock! LSB 735 st.1

The first stanza to the familiar hymn, *Have No Fear, Little Flock,* assures us that we have nothing to fear even though the world is in disarray. It is easy to lose sight of the big picture when you are bombarded daily with images and reports of natural disasters and lawlessness and a worldwide pandemic. Thank God for His Word that helps to refocus our worldview with the assurance that we are in His hands. The psalmist reminds us, "*The heavens are yours; the earth also is yours; the world and all that is in it, you have founded them*" (*Ps. 89:11*).

The hymn and God's Word pull no punches—do not be afraid—God is bigger than what we are experiencing. Yet, we all seem to be anxious, checking the 24-hour news cycle for the next jolt to our insecurity. And it isn't just the coronavirus. Besides health, many are afraid of losing their jobs. Some fear an economic, environmental, or societal collapse, for others it's a loss of personal freedom. Christians also are afraid; afraid that our influence in America is collapsing and that freedom of religion is teetering. Any way you dice it, it's all about control. What we are most afraid of losing points to who or what we worship; where we place our trust. The first test to know that we are actually worshiping the right God is fear.

To an unbelieving world and even in the church, believe it or not, the fear of God is a silly notion. We know that God is increasingly rejected in America but even among many Christians, God is reduced to a supporting actor in our life movie: He helps us find happiness, good health, and fortune. Just mention the fear of God in a conversation and watch the eyebrows rise up.

We worship what we fear most. The fear of catching COVID-19 is one of the greatest fears right now. We know that people don't worship a virus, but many do worship health—physical and mental wellness. Fear is an indicator of the object of our worship, ultimately the one in whom we place our trust. If we look to our nation's leaders for security are we telling our neighbors that we don't trust in the One who said, "Fear not, little flock, for it is your Father's good pleasure to give you the kingdom" (Luke 12:32)? Jesus' words

calm our fears reminding us that we belong to him.

When Jesus warns of coming persecution, it's not to instill fear in his disciples, but that they hope in him alone, because of his victory: "I have said these things to you that in me you may have peace. In the world you will have tribulation. But take heart; I have overcome the world" (John 16:33). These words of Jesus give us great comfort. Another comfort for the believer is that the fear of God isn't really fear. It actually means that God alone is terrifying in his glory, righteous in his judgments, and merciful to all who call on his name. The right kind of fear, godly fear, "casts out fear" and leads to trust and love (1 Jn 4:18).

When we fear God, not even death can threaten us because it is the "last enemy" whose claim on us has been made null and void (1 Cor 15:50-57). Therefore, we now care for this world not because it will be destroyed but because it will be restored (Rom 8:18-25). Our lives now move out to our neighbors instead of being turned in on ourselves. We are energized by freedom, not fear, "for God gave us a spirit not of fear but of power and love and self-control" (2 Tim 1:7). The true headline is, "It's Easter!" Because each Lord's Day we gather to celebrate the Resurrection of Jesus.

When we fear God, all other fears become manageable, not by human pride, but calmed by the Good Shepherd who has brought us into His fold—His Kingdom. "The fear of the LORD is the beginning of wisdom, and the knowledge of the Holy One is insight" (Prov. 9:10) and the wisdom of God is Christ (1 Cor. 1:30).

The fear of God leads to trust and trust bears the fruit of the Spirit, for a harvest of blessings for ourselves and for others. If God uses challenging times to bring us to rest in him, what better outcome could there be?

"Trust in the LORD with all your heart, and do not lean on your own understanding. In all your ways acknowledge him, and he will make straight your paths. Be not wise in your own eyes; fear the LORD, and turn away from evil. It will be healing to your flesh and refreshment to your bones" (Proverbs 3:5-8).

Let us pray. Holy Father, through the shed blood of Your Son Jesus Christ on the cross for the forgiveness of our sins, you have brought us into Your Kingdom. Thank You for Your grace and mercy. Thank You for loving us, even when we were dead in our trespasses and sins. Thank You for choosing us to be Your very own, even before creation itself. We no longer live in fear but have Your perfect peace. Help us to show that perfect peace to a world that lives in fear. Give us the words to speak in love, that those outside Your Kingdom may join us in following the One true God, Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. Amen.

"The grace of the Lord Jesus Christ and the love of God and the fellowship of the Holy Spirit be with you all" (2 Cor. 13:14).

Perhaps you have noticed a sign like this at the beginning of a buffet line in a restaurant: "Take as much as you want, but please eat all you take." The hope was that all the diners would have plenty to eat but that there would be no wasted food.

God gave the same direction to His children wandering in the desert. He said, "Take all the manna you can eat but not more than you need for the day." Every morning the people went out and gathered what they would need for the day. Some, however, gathered a little more so they could store it up for the next day. What an unpleasant surprise to discover in the morning that their manna was full of maggots and smelled!

God still gives us manna. In Luther's explanation to the first Article of the Creed, he wrote that God promises to provide "all that I need to support this body and life." Most of us find that we have enough for today, tomorrow, and as far into the future as we can imagine. Yet at times we get a little greedy. We want more than our shares. We hoard for the proverbial "rainy day." It's at this point that our attitudes begin to stink!

If this is the case with you, the best thing to do is to look again at the blessings God has given you. The surest road to contentment is gratitude. As you begin thanking God for all that He has done for you and given you, your attitude will sweeten once more.

"Take all of My gifts you want," God says, "but use them to help those around you." Part of gratitude is spoken thanks, but an even bigger part is shown through the way you use the gifts God has given you. May God help us all have grateful and willing hearts to share with others.

"For you know the grace of our Lord Jesus Christ that though He was rich, yet for your sake He became poor, so that you by His poverty might become rich" (2 Corinthians 8:9).

The writer of Hebrews tells us that Jesus is the "radiance of the glory of God and the exact imprint of His nature, and He upholds the universe by the word of His power" (Hebrews 1:3). In his book Stewards of the Kingdom, Scott Rodin wrote the following. "It is only by grace that we have knowledge of God. It is only by grace that we know God as Father, Jesus as Savior, and the Spirit as Comforter. It is only by grace that we know ourselves as created for relationship with God, as redeemed by the precious blood of this Savior, and as participants in the life of God and mission of God's people through the movement of this Spirit." Our relationship with God should prompt us to reflect His grace in our thoughts and action.
